 Time: 121 minutes. Age limit: - 11 years.

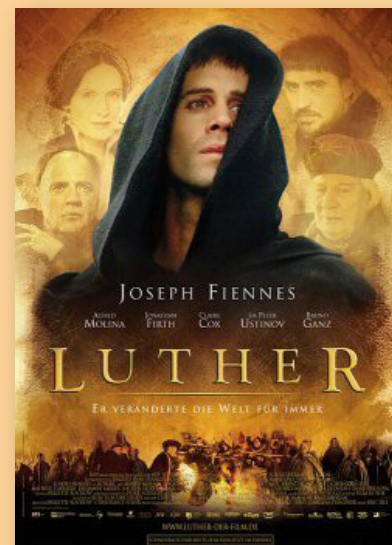

The Eye of the Eagle

Denmark 1997. Scriptwriter on the history of Bjarne O. Henriksen. Director: Peter Flinth. Came out on DVD in 2000. Film time 90 minutes. Age limit: - 7 years.

The film looks back on the Church and Royal power in the Middle Ages. You can use it in classes so that students have an understanding before working with the Reformation.

The King's son Valdemar and the boy-cook meet. Valdemar still believes in the teachings of the monks' God, but his father is at war. Bishop Eskild governs on the monks' God, and he prepares himself for how he can become King of Denmark. The two boys discover that there will be a coup against Valdemar's father, and they take off to prevent this. Unfortunately the boys did not succeed in warning the King's men so both the King and Valdemar are taken to prison. The boy-cook Aske though has a plan, preventing the one-eyed Knight from killing both the King and Valdemar.

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
